



2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

- The faculty of the departments engages in classroom debates, discussions, case analysis, open book exams, literature reviews, interactions and organizes seminars, lectures, presentations, hands-on training, tutorial and remedial classes, besides using ICTs in the classroom in order to help the students understand the course content. The faculty provides room for students to question and engage in interactions and discussions during classroom lectures.
- Students are also asked to give seminars in the class on selected areas and topics. These seminars are done individually or in groups which help the students at the individual level and in collaborative learning. In a number of departments these seminars are made mandatory and also graded. Feedback on their performances is always given during the process. Library and home assignments are also given to students that help in honing independent learning skills. The departments also organize workshops, industrial and institutional visits and field trips.
- Besides this, the departments makes extensive use of equipment such as OHP, LCD projectors, the Edu-Sat room and Conference Room and the library with internet facility to provide the students with additional resources for their studies.



6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The major part of the curriculum is designed and developed by the affiliating university. However, for a number of professional courses the college has taken an active role by providing valuable suggestions to the university to bring about necessary changes to make the curriculum more comprehensive and holistic. Also, some departments have taken initiative to introduce hands-on (not in syllabus) and classroom seminars to provide students an extra edge in their learning.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Departments generally implement a uniform teaching and learning process. In addition, each department adopts some specific strategy that is best suited for the students of that respective department. Some of them are as follows:

- Introduction of Semester System
- Continuous Assessment and periodical tests.
- Industry Exposure and field study.
- Guest lectures by experts from different subjects and fields.
- Students' seminars and presentations.
- Group discussions and role plays.
- Project work and assignments.
- Hands-on (apart from syllabus)
- Library assignments

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The College internally conducts two types of examinations in a year-Terminal and Selection. Apart from that, most departments follow a continuous pattern of assessing students through class tests, work assignments and projects and class seminars.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The College has made available all the resources of the library, laboratories and computers for encouraging research activities to both student and staff.
- Grants and sanctions of leave to the teaching faculty for attending programmes and undertaking field works / research activities are made available.
- The College through the respective departments organizes workshops, conferences and seminars in several fields from time to time. In this regard, the College has formally signed MoUs for collaborative research projects with leading institutions within and outside the country.
- The College provides financial incentives to faculty and students for projects and honorarium for publications.
- The College continues to publish two peer review journals to encourage and enhance publication of the faculty

Library:

- The total number of text and reference books purchased during 2014-2015 is 1,528 at the cost of Rs. 12.23 lakhs.
- Initiation of RFID tagging of books and digitization of library has already begun

ICT:

• ICT tools have been upgraded and replaced where necessary. Many class rooms are fitted with Digital interactive boards replacing the old black and white boards.

Physical Infrastructure/Instrumentation:

- The gymnasium has been upgraded.
- Work on the Construction of the New Commerce & Management bock has started
- The New building and infrastructure for the Extension campus at Byndihati, East Jaintia Hills District has already begun
- A central instrument facility for the Science departments is being created
- Renovations of laboratory and classrooms
- A proper waste management system was formally introduced in the campus.
- Usage of existing infrastructure to the maximum with the introduction of Night College for the Young-At-Risk (YAR) with minimum fees.

- The College deputes faculty to different schools for providing assistance in quality aspects of the Institution by training the teachers and students.
- The different clubs of the College are encouraged to take up visits and organize development camps in remote villages during vacations.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Due to the geographical location of the college, the scope for industry interaction is very limited. However, the College encourages all departments to undertake industry exposure trips within and outside the North Eastern Region whenever and wherever possible. Resources and facilities for the same are provided as and when required. All departments are encouraged to invite experts from various industries to visit the college.

The College, through the IQAC and Departments organised trainings, workshops and orientation programmes for its lab-assistants and other nonteaching staffs.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

- The College educates its students on the need to be environmental friendly and how to dispose waste materials properly in garbage bins placed at strategic locations in the Campus. It has also planted tree-sapling in parts of the Campus to help create a greener and more eco-friendly atmosphere. The staff and students are instructed to make judicious use of energy. Rain water is harvested and stored in properly constructed structures in the Hostels.
- Old electrical fittings in the college are gradually being replaced by the energy-efficient fittings and bulbs
- Almost all the computer monitors in use are either LCD or TFT types to ensure minimum usage of electricity and also to reduce the level of radiation.

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

Waste Management and Recycling:

The daily waste output (both bio-degradable and non-biodegradable) is collected in colour coded waste bins placed at appropriate locations in and around the College Campus. The segregated wastes are then sealed into bags and kept in the waste collection area. The bio-degradable waste is transferred to the vermicomposting units while the non-bio-degradable waste is taken care of by the Shillong Municipal Board Waste Disposal Unit, which collects the waste every alternate day. This practice has imbibed within every individual a sense of responsibility towards a clean and safe working environment.

It can be mentioned here that hazardous wastes are meticulously and properly disposed off in the following manner:

- Toxic wastes: There is a properly constructed Toxic Waste Disposal Pit within the college campus where these are disposed off following the appropriate procedures.
- Pathogens: Sterilization is performed by autoclaving and then the remaining wastes are properly disposed off, in accordance with standard waste disposal norms.

The College has organized extensive and intensive workshops and training programmes for laboratory assistants on "Maintenance and repair of Laboratory Equipment and Electronics" to cater to the maintenance need of departments with laboratory apparatus and to minimize waste production.

Inclusion Services:

The college had organized and conducted hands-on training on Basic Sciences for students belonging to higher secondary schools in Shillong. This provided the participants an opportunity to have a glimpse into the working intricacies of the science world. They were also allowed to have free access to the available resources like laboratory equipment and instruments. Such programmes were intended to generate an interest and encourage students to pursue a career in basic sciences.

On the other hand, the science students of St. Anthony's College also had the opportunity to share their knowledge and experience with the students from these schools.

- Apart from such programmes, the college had also organized interaction and practical sessions in science for that schools located in rural Meghalaya wherein the students were able to perform various experiments using the facilities provided by the college.
- Dead remains of specimens: These are properly wrapped in old newspapers and then sealed before disposal by incineration or collected by the Shillong Municipal Board Waste Disposal Unit.
