Extension:
The Anthonian Youth club (AYC) of the college has been able to put up four major activities during the year 2015-2016. The details of the activities are given below,
1) Village outreach program in Wahmyntait, RiBhoi district:
On the 11 th of December, 2015, the club carried out an outreach program to Wahmyntait village where clothes, shoes etc., were distributed to the villagers with the intention to share the joint of Christmas to the under-privileged.

The club observed the World No Tobacco day 2016 by organising two programs. The first was a inter school painting competition which was carried out on the 30 th of May 2016 on the them 'Say No To Tobacco'. The participating schools were;

A total number of seventy two students from these different schools participated in the competition.

On the second day (i.e., 31st May) an awareness program on the effects of tobacco was taken up in the college auditorium. The target group comprised of students from neighbouring schools. They were educated on the adverse effects of tobacco by the resource person who was from the office of the Directorate of Medical and Health Officer, Govertment of Meghalaya.In addition, they were given variety of lessons including short movies, video clips etc. from Fr.Saji Stephen, a faculty from the Value Education dept. of the college.

The winners of the painting competition were given awards on this day.

4) Outreach program to Stella Marris Sec. School, Wahlang village.

This program was carried out on **12**th **and 13**th **September, 2016.**The students of class IX and Xof this schoolwere taught the following lessons;

- 1. Basic computer skills
- 2. Environmental studies
- 3. Biology practical (Mitosis)
- 4. Career guidance

The team was led by Sir Alban D. Marbaniang (teacher in charge) and Miss Baiamonlang C. Nongdhar (Teacher In charge) and 20 volunteers from the club.

Launching of Red Ribbon Club cum HIV/AIDS Awareness Programme

The NSS Unit of ST. Anthony's College along with the Red Ribbon Club and MAC hosted the HIV/AIDS Awareness Programme on the 19th of May 2016. The programme took place in the Conference Hall of the said college, and 143 student-volunteers and 3 Programme Officers of NSS participated in the event. The programme was on the nature of the disease, its stigmas, myths and preventive measures.

Human Trafficking Awareness Programme

A Human Trafficking Awareness Programme was organised in Saadar Police Station in Police Bazaar by a United Nations initiative on the 25th of June 2016, where 10 students and 1 Programme Officer attended the programme. The programme was on the trafficking of women and children in India and the crippling effect the trade had on the society and economy of the country, and also on the harmful effects of drug abuse. Cancer Awareness Programme

A Cancer Awareness Programme was held in the State Convention Centre in Bivar Road, Bishop Cotton Road on the 26th of July 2016. It was organised by the Public Health Foundation of India and the Indian Institute of Public Health of Shillong and 7 students and 1 Programme Officer of the NSS Unit of St. Anthony's attended the event. (State Level

1st State Level NSS Meet

The National Service Scheme of NEHU organised the 1st State Level Meet in its Multi-Use Convention Centre between the 3rd and 5th August 2016. It was attended by all the NSS Units of the affiliated colleges in Shillong; there were 10 volunteers and 1 Programme Officer from St. Anthony's were present. The theme of the programme was "Bridging Differences, Bonding Diversity". (State Level)

The Tiranga March

The Tiranga March was conducted on the 22nd of August 2016 by the NSS Unit of NEHU and the Department of Youth Affairs in the institution's campus. 15 NSS volunteers took part in the event. The purpose of the march was to celebrate the 70th Independence Day of India where the programme started with a one-hour 'Suvichar' Session, in which eminent persons addressed the volunteers about Nationalism and the National Flag. This was followed by the Tiranga March around the University Campus, the front marchers carrying National Flags, while the other volunteers carry placards, depicting messages of Nationalism. Workshop on Swachhta Pakhwada

A workshop on Swachhta Pakhwada was organised on the 24th of August 2016 by the NSS Cell of NEHU in its Convention Hall. The workshop was attended by 8 students. The motive of this programme was to instill to the volunteers a sense of nationwide cleanliness and hygiene.(University Level)

Mother Teresa International Film Festival

The Mother Teresa International Film Fest was orchestrated by the World Catholic Association for Communications, India in the U Soso Tham Auditorium in Shillong between the 6th and the 9th of September 2016. It was attended by 17 NSS student-volunteers and 2 Programme Officers of St. Anthony's College. (International Level)

Blood Donation Camp

A blood donation camp was mobilised by the NSS Unit of St. Anthony's College in collaboration with MACS and Nazareth Hospital, Shillong on the 15th of September 2016 in the Conference Hall of St. Anthony's College. 25 student-volunteers and 4 Programme Officers attended the event. The camp saw many blood donors from the college and the NSS Unit too. Prior to the camp, a seminar was presented by Dr. Heubert Dkhar of Nazareth Hospital on the 14th of September on the benefits and misconceptions of blood giving.

47th NSS Foundation Day 2016

The NSS unit of St. Anthony's College assembled 16 of its many volunteers with 3 PO's, along with other colleges, in NEHU to celebrate the 47th Foundation Day at the Multi-Use Convention Centre, NEHU. Starting at 10:30 am on 24th September, 2016, the programme focused on the NSS's achievements of the year, and awards were handed out to the best NSS unit, volunteer and programme officer. A speech was conducted where the volunteers were enlightened to carry on the path of giving back to the community and to work together as a team. Entertainment

segments held by the volunteers were then held after the formal ceremony had ended, wrapping up the programme of the day at 4 pm. (University Level)

International Youth Day

The NSS unit of St. Anthony's College attended the International Youth Day convention which was held in the Aurobindo Hall of Shri Aurobindo Institute of Indian Culture, on the 27th of September 2016 from 9am to 5pm along with 2 PO's and16 volunteers. The theme of the programme was 'The Road to 2030: Eradictaing Poverty and Achieving Sustainable Consumption and Production With Special Reference to Infected and Affected People Living With HIV in Meghalaya'. Speeches were made referring to the sexually transmitted disease where caution, awareness and preventive measures were imparted to the audience. Competitions like debate, extempore speech and open mic with vigorous participation were run, accompanied by pleasing performances by a dance group, an accapella group and a fashion show. There was then a prize distribution which concluded the event. (State Lavel)

NSS Special Camp

The most awaited program of the National Service Scheme was the Special Camp, which was held between the 10th to 16th of October 2016 in Swer village. Six Program Officers accompanied 50 volunteers to the tranquil place where they were greeted with dense fog and rain that lasted a few days in the beginning of the camp.

The Special Camp is often a huge opportunity for the campers to experience a different life in the village for a week's time unlike what they usually cope with in college and homes. The campers, 50 in number and then divided into 5 groups of 10 members each, put their entire heart and soul into each and every activity. Due to the incessant rain in Swer though, the campers had to stay in for a few days where their planned outdoor activities were swapped for indoor ones instead. This, however, did not dampened their spirits for in the evenings, as the rain beat against the roof of the Community Hall in Swer, the campers entertained the villagers with cultural programs like debates, extempore speeches, dancing, singing and skit competitions that lit the Hall with amusement and delight.

Luck favoured the campers as the rain stopped on the 13th of October where they carried on the basic purpose of their stay at Swer, which was to continue the construction of the previous year's incomplete footpath between Swer and Village PHC for the convenience of the local pedestrians there, which, when finished, measured 20 metres in length. Other alternative activities were the dental hygiene programme conducted by Dr. Hubert Dkhar from Shillong's Nazareth Hospital and a nurse on an internship from Switzerland where they imparted general health guidance on the importance of a nutritious diet and healthy lifestyle; and a daily arts and crafts between the campers and friendly children of Swer. There was also a day set for a football match held between the campers and the villagers where St. Anthony's emerged as winners.

With this benevolent service, the NSS unit of St. Anthony's College has truly lived up to its motto 'Not Me, But You'.
