- Orientation programmes organised for the first year Under Graduate and Post Graduate students which made them feel at home and learned lessons well and better prepared them for college and university life.

- In the purchased land of 150 acres to plant ginger, tapioca, pineapple, broom and vegetables:
  - The college was able to cultivate three acres of ginger, one acre of tapioca, one acre of pineapple and two acres of brooms and vegetables. This has generated income to the college and vegetables were provided for the consumption of hostellers.

- **Best Practice I:  
Solar Panel Installation**

We are living in the world which is all for environmental sustainability and people are searching everyday for new ways to make their contribution to the environment. A small but drastic step was also taken by our institution. The college administration realised the need for making the college environmental-friendly. Solar energy is a safe alternative for coal and gas for electricity. It is also cheaper than hydro and thermal powers. After a long struggle, the college was able to install solar panels which became active in December 2017. It is noteworthy to mention that the solar panel is the only one of its kind in the state that is connected with the grid. A grid connected system has the advantage of effective utilization of generated power because there are no storage losses involved. Not to forget it is also cost effective. The grid connected solar panels has ensured a reduction in the consumption of electricity and hence reduced the cost of expenditure which is spent on electricity.

The College is an ardent supporter of the “Go Green” campaign, for which it has replaced the incandescent bulbs with LED bulbs. Incandescent bulbs use five times as much power to produce the same amount of light as LED bulbs. How we light up the places we live and work makes a big impact on the environment. The kind of bulbs, the kinds of fixtures, the kind power and the habits we keep can all add up to a very significant greening. A conventional incandescent bulb turns only around five to ten percent of its consumed energy into light, the rest goes out as heat. CFL’s and LED’s are much safer to the environment as they emit less heat, use less energy and last longer, which in turn proves more efficient than the conventional incandescent bulbs. Under the able leadership of the Principal, and with the co-operation of staff members of St. Anthony’s College, various steps has been taken towards the sustainable development of the environment. Installation of Solar Panels in the campus and replacement of incandescent bulbs with CFL’s and LED’s are small but significant steps taken to promote a greener and cleaner environment.

- **Best practice II:  
Night Shift College, by Alumni Association.**

Education is a social right and no one should be denied this right on the basis of their financial and academic background. Keeping this in mind, St Anthony’s College Shillong Alumni Association (SACSAA) started the Evening College on June 2014. The evening college is an initiative made to impart education to the less fortunate and academically weak students. SACSAA has taken up this noble initiative keeping in mind the students who long to finish their degree course but are unable to do so because of their financial conditions and time constraint for they need to earn their livelihood and also support their family. Many financially and academically weak students have been able to complete their degree course and many more are on their way to complete it thanks to the evening college. The Evening College SACSAA, has employed well qualified teachers and the salary for these teachers is incurred by the Alumni itself. The students of the Evening College has to pay a very less amount of Rupees 5000 for two semester which is refunded if the students do well in their examinations and attend the classes

regularly. The college offers a three year degree course in Arts and Commerce stream. A very strict and vigilant screening is done to admit students in the evening college to ensure no foul play on the part of the students to be admitted. An admission committee is appointed to screen and interview the students before admitting them. The seats of the evening college is reserved only for financially weak students who have attained low percentage in their class XII examinations and preference is given for working students giving them a chance to finish their graduation. The initiative is very much appreciated by St. Anthony's College, Shillong and it feels pride in being associated in a noble cause as this.




